Editorial for vol. 11-2 (2019)

The Journal of City Law, classified by MEC/CAPES as Qualis A1, Law, and registered in the Web of Science, is pleased to report that now in 2019 it was reclassified by the University of Barcelona system, Spain, as a journal of an international reach and widespread in the information systems of world journals, reaching the good mark of the ICDS index of 9.6 (nine, six point).

It should be noted that ICDS - Secondary Broadcast Composite Index - is one of the main indexes of internationalization and visibility of a scientific journal in different scientific databases of international reach, and is calculated by the Information Matrix for the Analysis of Journals – MIAR, of the University of Barcelona, Spain.

This composite index is calculated from 05 global citation databases, 08 global multidisciplinary databases, 101 specialized databases and 06 international journal evaluation databases.

Regarding the ICDS index, it is worth mentioning that it is an indicator that shows the visibility of a scientific journal in different scientific databases of international reach. A high ICDS means that the Journal is present in different sources of internationally relevant information around the world. The index has a maximum value of 11 (eleven) points, which means that the Journal is disseminated internationally.

This index of internationalization is one of the best indexes achieved by a Brazilian legal journal and not far from the Brazilian scientific journals of other areas that are better placed (Data Magazine, etc.), demonstrating the exogeny and internationalization of our journal.

We publish in this issue the article “Policies for access to urban land: An analysis on the conformation of priorities and inequalities in the city of Commodore Rivadavia during the last 20 years”, by Prof. Santiago Bachiller, full professor of the National University of Southern Patagonia, Argentina, and Letizia Vazquez, doctoral fellowship of the National Council for Scientific and Technical Research (CONICET) at the Institute of Social and Political Studies of Patagonia, Argentina. This article, “Policies for access to urban land: An analysis of the conformation of priorities and inequalities in the city of Commodore Rivadavia during the last 20 years”, is part of the research line on inequality in access to urban land. It examines the changes that have been made by municipal legal systems

regulating access to urban land in Comodoro Rivadavia (Chubut Province, Argentina) over the past twenty years (in a context of oil boom and significant population increase). It deepens the analysis of the relationship between normative changes, the housing deficit and the land grabbing process. In this sense, the article implies delimiting its debate in the production contexts of the different orders, deconstructing the state logic that defines the requirements of access to the soil, and analyzing how these policies create subjects (establishing boundaries between those who benefit from the orders and those who are see kicked out of all legal access to the ground).
