In this issue we publish the City Law Dossier: conflicts and solutions during the Covid-19 pandemic, with 14 articles, 04 of which are articles by foreign professors. This article "Covid-19 crisis management in Mexico: initial reopening" analyzes that the COVID-19 pandemic shook the whole world throughout 2020. In Mexico, the management of this crisis fell to a federal government that took power in December 2018 and promised to prioritize the poor and the marginalized. It argues that the health system was neglected for many years and undergoes a process of transformation (OECD, 2019; Presidency of the Republic, 2019). This article examines how federal government agencies managed the initial phase of the crisis, involving general confinement at the national level, and the first six weeks of gradual reopening of activities, the so-called "new normality", which has been implemented by subnational governments. Crisis management theory was used as a theoretical framework to analyze coordination instruments in a deeply fragmented health system, leadership styles and the implementation of voluntary quarantine avoiding coercive measures. Regarding the methodology, a mixed case study was described based on federal regulatory instruments, abundant publicly available official information and a literature review for the study

period. Finally, in the final section, the reasons why the crisis management in Mexico was considered acceptable during the first months of the crisis were highlighted.
